TO THE MOST HIGH AND MIGHTIE Prince , IAMES by the grace of God King of Great Britaine , France and Ireland , Defend of the Faith , &c. THE TRANSLATORS OF *THE BIBLE* , wifh Grace , Mercie , and Peace , through IESVS CHRIST our LORD.

Reat and manifold were the bleffings (most dread Soueraigne) which Almighty GOD, the Father of all Mercies, beftowed vpon vs the people of ENGLAND, when first he fent your Maiesties Royall perfon to rule and raigne ouer vs. For whereas it was the expectation of many, who wished not well vnto our SION, that vpon the fetting of that bright *Occidentall Starre* Queene ELIZABETH of most happy memory, fome thicke and palpable cloudes of darkenesse would fo haue ouersthadowed this land, that men should haue bene in doubt which way they were to walke, and that it should hardly be knowen, who was to direct the vnsetted state : the appeareance of your MAIESTIE, as of the *Sunne* in his strength, instantly dispelled those fupposed and furmised mists, and gaue vnto all that were well affected, exceeding cause of comfort ; especially when we beheld the gouernement established in your HIGHNESSE, and your hopefull Seed, by an vndoubted Title, and this also accompanied with Peace and tranquillitie, at home and abroad.

But amongst all of Ioyes, there was no one that more filled our hearts, then the blessed continuance of the Preaching of GODS facred word amongst vs, which is that inestimable treasure, which excelleth all the riches of the earth, because the fruit thereof extendeth it felse¹, not onely to the time spent in this transitory world, but directeth and disposethmen vnto that Eternall happinesse which is aboue in Heauen.

Then , not to fuffer this to fall to the ground , but rather to take it vp , and to continue it in that flate, wherein the famous predeceffour of your HIGHNESSE did leaue it ; Nay , to goe forward with the confidence and refolution of a man in maintaining the trueth of CHRIST , and propagating it farre and neere , is that which hath fo bound and firmely knit the hearts of all your MAIESTIES loyall and Religious people vnto you, that your very Name is precious among them , their eye doeth behold you with comfort , and they bleffe you in their hearts , as that fanctified perfon , who vnder GOD , is the immediate authour of their true happineffe. And this their contentment doeth not diminifh or decay, but euery day increafeth and taketh ftrength , when they obferue that the zeale of your Maieftie towards the houfe of GOD , doth not flacke or goe backward , but is more and more kindled , manifefting it felfe abroad in the furtheft parts of *Christendome* , by writing in defence of the Trueth , (which hath giuen fuch a blow vnto that man of Sinne , as will not be healed) and euery day at home , by Religious and learned difcourfe , by frequenting the houfe of GOD , by hearing the word preached , by cherifhing the teachers therof , by caring for the Church as a moft tender and louing nourcing Father.

There are infinite arguments of this right Chriftian and Religious affection in your MAIESTIE : but none is more forcible to declare it to others , then the vehement and perpetuated defire of the accomplifhing and publifhing of this Worke , which now with all humilitie we prefent vnto your MAIESTIE. For when your Highneffe had once out of the deepe iudgment apprehended , how conuenient it was , That out of the Originall facred tongues , together with comparing of the labours , both in our owne and other forreigne Languages , of many worth men who went before vs, there fhould be one more exact Tranflation of the holy Scriptures into the *Englifh tongue* ; your MAIESTIE did neuer defift , to vrge and to excite those to whom it was commended , that the worke might be haftened , and that the bufineffe might be expedited in fo decent a maner , as a matter of fuch importance might iuftly require.

And now at last , by the Mercy of GOD , and the continuance of our Labours , it being brought vnto fuch a

conclusion, as that we haue great hope that the Church of *England* shall reape good fruit thereby; we hold it our duety to offer it to your MAIESTIE, not onely as to our King and Soueraigne, but as to the principall moouer and Author of the Worke. Humbly crauing of your most Sacred Maiestie, that fince things of this quality haue euer bene fubiect to the censures of ill meaning and difcontented perfons, it may receiue approbation and Patronage from so learned and iudicious a Prince as your Highnesse is, whose allowance and aceptance of our Labours, shall more honour and incourage vs, then all the calumniations and hard interpretations of other men so that, if on the one fide we shall be traduced by Popish perfons at home or abroad, who therefore will maligne vs, because we are poore Instruments to make G odd by Trueth to be yet more and more knowen vnto the people, whom they defire shall to keepe in ignorance and darknesse, and giue liking vnto nothing but what is framed by themselues, and hammered on their Anuile; we may reft fecure, fupported within by the trueth and innocencie of a good confcience, hauing walked the wayes of fimplicitie and integritie, as before the Lord; And fustained without, by the powerfull Protection of your Maiesties grace and fauour, which will euer giue countenance to honess and Christian endeuours, against bitter censures, and vncharitable imputations.

The LORD of Heauen and earth bleffe your Maieftie with many and happy dayes, that as his Heauenly hand hath enriched your Highneffe with many fingular, and extradordinary Graces; fo you may be the wonder of the world in this later age, for happineffe and true felicitie, to the honour of that Great G OD, and the good of his Church, through IESVS CHRIST our Lord and onely Sauiour.
